

Analysis of Monetary Poverty and Welfare of Households with Children in 2021

Analytical Report



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(Results of the Household Budget Survey)

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PREFACE

The analytical report contains statistical information on the general characteristics of households with children by area of residence, number of children, household type, quintile, level of poverty and welfare.

The main source of information to compute the standard set of poverty indicators is the Household Budget Survey¹ (HBS), carried out by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS). The main purpose of the HBS is to determine the various aspects of the living standards of the population, including of different socio-economic groups, in terms of income, expenditures, consumption, living conditions and other indicators that characterise the welfare.

Poverty in the Republic of Moldova is measured on the basis of consumption expenditure and absolute poverty threshold (consisting of two components: food and non-food) and includes the monetary value of the consumption basket, deemed to cover the minimum basic needs, acceptable at national level. The poverty indicators were calculated according to the methodology² approved by the Order of NBS Director General No 56 of 24 August 2018, supplemented by NBS Order No 15 of 2 July 2020.

The data are presented without the territory on the left bank of the Nistru river and Bender municipality and are based on the population with usual residence.



1. General characteristic of households with children

According to the 2021 Household Budget Survey, households with children under 18 account for 30.4% of all households of the Republic of Moldova, down 0.7 percentage points compared with 2020 (31.1%). A share of 55.8% of households with children are from rural areas.


Households with one child remain predominant in the structure of households with children -48.8% of the total households, followed by households with two children -37.1%, and those with three or more children -14.0% respectively. (Figure 1).

Figure 1. Household structure by presence of children and number of children, 2021, %




In urban areas, one in two households with children consists of only one child, while approximately one in ten – three or more children. The same trend is maintained in rural areas, where about 46 percent are single-child households, but households with three or more children account for approximately 18 percent (Figure 2).


Figure 3. Distribution of households with children by household type and area of residence, 2021, %

Depending on the type of household, they are predominantly formed by family couples with children (62.9%) and households classified as "other households with children" which are cases of households formed by multiple family nuclei (30.5%). Single-parent households represent 6.6% of the total number of households with children. In urban areas the proportion of single-parent households is 4.9 percentage points higher than in rural areas. A similar situation is characteristic for family couples with children, which are more common in urban areas. At the same time, in rural areas, there are more households classified as "other households with children" (Figure 3).

The type and structure of households with children also determine the average household size. Thus, in 2021 the average size of a household with children was 3.9 people, with a difference between urban areas -3.7 people and rural areas -4.1 people.

The household size and the number of children in the household are determining factors for the level of vulnerability of both households in general and those with children. The distribution of households with children according to their level of well-being shows that the wealthier the quintile, the lower the number of households with children. Thus, 24.2% of households with children are in quintile I (20% of the population with lowest income), in comparison with 18.3% of households in quintile V (20% of the category with the highest income). The situation of urban households with children is different from rural households. While in urban areas the increase of households' welfare determines the increase in the share of households with children from 8.5% for the households for quintile I to 32.2% for quintile V, the trend in rural areas is reversed. Of all rural households with children, 36.6% are in the category with the lowest income, and only 7.2% belong to the category with the highest income (Figure 4).

Overall, a higher welfare level of households with children is mainly characteristic for households with one child (65.7%) and family couples with children (72.1%), and according to their residence, 78.0% of them are urban households. Furthermore, from all the households with children with the lowest income, 84.5% live in rural area, 37.5% of them having 2 children. Another characteristic for these households is the fact that practically one in two households (54.8%) is formed of family couples with children.


2. Households with children and members abroad

The migration phenomenon has a bigger impact on households with children. While almost 8.2% of all households have at least one member working or searching for a job abroad, in the case of households with children this share amounts to 15.8%. In the rural area the households with children and with at least one member abroad account for 19.6%, compared with 10.9% in the urban area. A share of 69.5% of households with children and members abroad are from rural areas.

Among the households with children and members abroad, households with one child (45.2%) and those with 2 children (37.9%) predominate. A similar structure is found in the case of households with children and no members abroad.


Depending on the type of the household, 59.2% of the households with children and members abroad are represented by family couples with children. The share of 40.8% of households with children and members abroad are represented by other households with children (households formed of several family nuclei). The structure of households with children and without members abroad is different. Practically two thirds of the households are represented by family couples with children (63.7%), followed by other households with children - 28.5% and one-parent households - 7.8% (Figure 5).

Depending on the level of household welfare and existence of members abroad, we find that of all households with children, where at least one member is abroad, 21.7% make up a part of the category with the lowest income (quintile I), while 24.6% of all households with children without members abroad are included in this quintile (Figure 6).

Figure 6. Distribution of households with children by quintile, with or without members abroad, 2021, %




3. Income of households with children

The income of households determines not only their socio-economic status, but also their vulnerability level. Incomes of households with children are different in size and structure in comparison with the incomes earned by households without children. Incomes of households with children are substantially lower than the incomes of households without children. In 2021, the disposable income of households with children amounted to an average of MDL 3005.0 per person every month compared to MDL 4011.9 for households without children. Furthermore, the average disposable income per person for all the categories of households in the country constituted MDL 3510.1.

In households with children, the main income source is salary (55.0%), followed by income from individual non-farming activity (10.0%), social benefits (9.2%) and individual farming activity (7.7%). An important income source for households with children continues to be transfers from abroad, representing on average 14.8% of their income – by 3.9 percentage points higher than in the case of households without children (Figure 7).

Figure 7. Structure of disposable income, depending on presence of children, 2021, %




The level of income of households with children depends on several factors, including: area of residence, number of children, household type and quintile.

The area of residence is a key factor to determine the welfare level of households with children. The rural population is mainly involved in the agricultural sector which usually does not generate a decent income. As a result, the monthly income of rural households with children is by 32.5% lower than the income of urban households. In urban areas, about 65.6% of the income is generated by salaries, and about 10.5% came from individual non-farming activities. At the same time, only 43.8% of the rural households' income is generated by salaries and 15.6% – from individual farming activity.


Figure 8. Average income of households with children by number of children and type of household, 2021

Depending on the number of children, households with one child are in a better situation with a monthly income of MDL 3568.1 per person in comparison with MDL 2034.7 in the case of households with three or more children. Regarding the type of household, it was found that the lowest income is characteristic for households made up of several family nuclei – MDL 2659.3 per person monthly (Figure 8).

Regardless of the type of household, the main income source is salary, with a contribution ranging from 57.7% for family couples to 49.7% for households made up of several family nuclei. The contribution of salaries varies depending on the number of children in the household, from 59.2% for households with one child to 38.3% for those with three or more children (Figure 8). This could be explained by the fact that about 71% of large families (with three and more children) are from rural areas, where opportunities to earn additional income are limited.


Figure 9. Structure of disposable income of households with children by quintiles, 2021, %

The unequal distribution of the income of households with children is highlighted by their distribution in quintiles. Thus, in the case of households with the lowest income (quintile I) the average monthly income per person was MDL 1808.7 lei, which is about 3 times lower than the income of the persons with the highest income (quintile V). The sources of income of households with children also differ significantly depending on the welfare level of the household. In the case of households with the lowest income, salary contribution to income generation accounts for only 42.0%, while in the case of households with the highest income, salary generated income accounts for 67.0%. In the structure of income of households from quintile I, 14.0% is represented by individual farming activity, compared with 2.8% for households from quintile V. Social benefits are more important for households with the lowest income, amounting to 16.5% of total disposable income, by 9.3 percentage points more than in the case of households with higher income (Figure 9).

Households with children are less dependent on social benefits, in comparison with households without children. On average they account for 9.2% of the total income. A share of 36% of these benefits is formed on the basis of different types of pensions, 35.4% representing child benefits, 9.7% – social aid and the rest – other social payments (Figure 10).


The social payments are more important for households with many children (15.9% of the total income), but also for households made up of several family nuclei (14.6%). At the same time, family couples with children benefit the most from child benefits (58.0%), while households with one child and those made up of several family nuclei benefit more from different types of allowances (Figure 10).


Figure 11. Structure of social benefits by type, depending on the number of children and type of household, 2021, %

Of all social benefits, 37% are social security benefits and 63 – social assistance benefits. The more children in the household, the higher is the share of social assistance benefits in the structure of social benefits, growing from 49.0% for households with one child to 84.4% for households with three and more children. Depending on the type of the household, a higher dependence on social security benefits is registered among households made up of several family nuclei (60.1% of the total social benefits), and in the case of family couples and single parent households, the most important are the social assistance benefits (85.9% and 62.5%, respectively) (Figure 11).

4. Child poverty


The absolute poverty rate for the total population and poverty among children fluctuated during 2019-2021. Given that in 2021 the absolute poverty rate of the overall population constituted 24.5%³, by 2.3 percentage points lower compared to 2020, the child poverty rate was 24.4% (-1.6 percentage points compared to the previous year) (Figure 12). At the same time, 8.9% of children suffer from extreme poverty, compared to 9.5% of the total population (Figure 13).

Children's situation differs significantly depending on their area of residence. Children in rural areas are at a much higher risk of impoverishment than children in urban areas. Thus, the poverty rate of rural children constituted 35.0% in 2021 compared to 9.2% in the case of urban children. At the same time, the child poverty rate decreased by 3.3 percentage points compared to the previous year in urban area, and by 0.7 percentage points in the rural area (Figure 14).

Figure 14. Absolute poverty rate among children by area of residence, 2019-2021, %




Household's features like the number of children and type of households also determine the vulnerability level of households with children. The risk of families with children entering poverty increases considerably with the birth of the next child. Thus, in 2021 households with three and more children registered the highest poverty rate (36.9%), while households with one child registered the lowest one (17.1%). Depending on the type of the household, children from households made up of several family nuclei face the highest risk of entering poverty (33.2%), since this type of households prevails in rural areas where the poverty incidence is generally higher (Figure 15).

Figure 15. Absolute poverty rate among children by the number of children and type of household, 2021, %




The occupational status of parents is one of the main factors that determine child welfare. The employment of parents diminishes essentially the probability of children entering poverty. Thus, the lowest poverty rate is registered in the case of children with both parents employed (14.0%), followed by children with at least one self-employed parent (24.0%). The highest level of poverty is recorded in the case of children form households with 'other situations', such as households with income from social benefits, remittances, etc. (31.5%) (Figure 16).

The presence of parents in the family is another important characteristic for assessing the child vulnerability. Overall, 15.0% of all children have both parents left for abroad. Parents working abroad have a positive economic impact on the financial situation of children. In families where at least one parent left for abroad, the child's financial situation is much better than in families with no parents abroad. Thus, in 2021 the poverty level of children with at least one parent abroad was by 5 percentage points lower than in the case of children with both parents at home (25.2%). At the same time, compared to the previous year, the poverty rate of children without parents abroad decreased by 1.4 percentage points, compared to 2.4 percentage points for children with parents abroad (Figure 17).

5. Impact of social benefits on child poverty rate

The impact of social benefits on the poverty rate is analysed by including or excluding them from the household income. Thus, if households did not receive child benefits, the absolute poverty rate would have constituted 27.2%, which is by 2.8 percentage points higher than the poverty rate according to the current estimates. Pensions have a slightly higher impact on the level of children's welfare, contributing to poverty reduction by 4.1 percentage points.

Analysing the impact of child benefits and social aid on child poverty, we can state that they both contributed to the reduction of poverty rate by 4.8 percentage points in 2021.
